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"Mind your beauty" Cosmetex 2014 opens on Gold Coast

As \$1 billion Australian cosmetic medical specialty continues to transform, there's a renewed emphasis on a healthy mind and healthy body as the starting point for beauty.

New techniques and treatments to cheat time and improve looks begin on the inside. To highlight this point, psychiatrist and author Prof David Castle will address the hundreds of cosmetic medical and surgical practitioners from around the world who have gathered on the Gold Coast for the start of Cosmetex 2014, which runs from Thursday, 1 May until Saturday 3 May.

Organised by the Australasian College of Cosmetic Surgery (ACCS), the annual Cosmetex conference, which brings together cosmetic and plastic surgeons, dermatologists, cosmetic physicians, nurses and other cosmetic health practitioners and industry suppliers, is one of the world's most important meetings in the specialty area of cosmetic medical practice and the largest of its kind in the southern hemisphere.

Prof Castle, who is Chair of Psychiatry, St Vincent's Hospital and the University of Melbourne, will give the opening plenary address – "The Relentless Pursuit of a Perfect Body".

"Cosmetic enhancement is culturally ubiquitous and has been so since ancient times. People of every culture have been known to adorn themselves; so we need to accept that as normal," Prof Castle said.

"And most people who undergo cosmetic enhancement procedures are happy with the results and we should not adversely judge them. But for some people it can go horribly wrong," Prof Castle said.



Prof Castle emphasised that it is vital that doctors ensure that their patient's expectations are realistic and that there are no underlying psychological reasons that would rule out cosmetic surgery.

Cosmetex keynote speaker US Facial Plastic Surgeon and author Dr Steven Dayan has merged ideas from neuropsychiatry, evolutionary biology, and aesthetic medicine to form his "Subliminal Difference" theory, which stresses the importance that small changes made to a person's face are natural looking for a positive result.

"If an outcome looks unnatural in even the slightest, it will inadvertently tip off the subconscious mind of the unknowing observer that one is not youthful or healthy – the exact opposite message that is intended to be sent", Dr Dayan said.

ACCS College President Dr Soo-Keat Lim said that the College was particularly pleased that Prof Castle, from St Vincent's and Dr Dayan from the USA had agreed to address Cosmetex.

"Both speakers have different messages but they both take account of the importance of how the mind works when considering cosmetic surgery," Dr Lim said.

"As Shakespeare put it, 'Love looks not with the eye but with the mind.' And whatever we do as practitioners to change people's outward appearance, we must always consider first what is within – what patients think and why, before prescribing a treatment," Dr Lim said.

Dr Lim noted the increasing emphasis practitioners are placing on nutrition, exercise, using sun protection and not smoking. "Good health is the keystone for beauty," Dr Lim said.

Dr Lim also stressed that it was important that consumers do their homework. "Anyone considering having a cosmetic procedure should ensure that they fully understand the risks as well as the benefits and that their practitioner is properly trained," Dr Lim said.

"It is a very exciting time for the rapidly growing discipline of cosmetic medical practice. We have leading practitioners in the areas of psychiatry, dermatology, cosmetic medicine and surgery, plastic surgery and many others from across the globe that have come to the Gold Coast and Cosmetex to share their knowledge and to learn from their Australian colleagues. This interaction provides enormous benefit for patients," Dr Lim said.

Fast Cosmetic Facts

- Responses to the College's 2013 procedural census show some practices growing by 15% per cent year on year.
- Total annual expenditure on cosmetic surgical and medical and related procedures and treatments in Australia is estimated to be \$1 billion.
- Australians annually consume more than \$350 million worth of wrinkle reduction procedures with botulinum toxin.
- There are approximately 8,000 breast augmentation surgeries performed each year in Australia and about 30,000 liposuction procedures.

Top five cosmetic procedures in Australia:

- Anti-wrinkle injections
- Fillers
- Laser and IPL
- Breast augmentation and reduction
- Liposuction

What is the ACCS Code of Practice?

The Code of Practice, which was authorised by the ACCC in June 2009, provides patients with greater protection than that found in regulation or other guidelines.

The Code of Practice covers advertising and other promotional conduct, informed consent guidelines, monitoring of the code and an extensive governance regime.
